ENVIRONMENT

By now most of us know what Fairtrade is. Fairtrade is the trade of products made in developing countries that ensures that everyone involved in the process is paid a fair price. These can be many different products, for example: bananas, sugar, cotton and much more. Lots of companies are involved in the Fairtrade project.



One of the main benefits of Fairtrade is that better wages are given to the farmers in developing countries that produce the products. This pushes more money into developing countries, and also creates a better livelihood for many people.

Something that many people aren't aware of is that Fairtrade is also environmentally sustainable. In order to sell Fairtrade products many measurements are put into place to help the environment. For example: soil improvement, managing waste and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Reducing greenhouse gas emissions is important because it slows the rate of global warming. Farmers may reduce emissions by using organic fertiliser, which will improve soil quality.

AXE VALLEY VS SIDMOUTH COLLEGE

On Thursday 27th of January the Year 11 boys' team travelled to Axe Valley for a football fixture. This was our first fixture of the year and we were excited to get back on the

pitch.





Axe Valley had the kick off, meaning Sidmouth had the choice of shooting right to left. It was a slow first 10 minutes for Sidmouth as they were met with constant attacking pressure. The first chance of the game came for Axe Valley as a freekick from the halfway line was lofted over the top of the Sidmouth defence, for their striker to counter onto the ball. With fantastic pressure from Leo. G (goalkeeper), the striker was able to send the ball over the crossbar. As the game continued Axe Valley applied the pressure which

conceded into a foul in the box by the Sidmouth defender, awarding the home side a penalty which was nicely placed into the net making it 1-0.

The Sidmouth heads didn't drop as they started to get into the rhythm of things with some excellent passing in midfield by Jake. P and some fantastic runs behind the defence from Fin. C, giving him the space to run down the wing to look for Adam. C waiting in the box.

Fin. C's cross into the box was blocked by an Axe Valley hand giving the away side a chance at the goal via a penalty which was calmly converted by Adam C. Sidmouth took this goal and shortly after a darting run into the box by Callum. L, his head met the corner from Will. P into the net giving the away side a 2-1 lead into half time.

In the second half Axe Valley's knowledgeable counter attack was seen again, but with some unbelievable challenges from Owen. B taught the Axe Valley team that there was no getting space from the Sidmouth defence.

Sidmouth fought back well as Adam. C dribbled past two of the Axe Valley defenders and squared it to Fin. C who was waiting patiently on the edge of the six yard box, making it 1-3 for Sidmouth.

Pressure by the Sidmouth players was not able to stop a wonderful

curling finish by the Axe Valley centre, mid shooting from 25 yards out with the ball hitting the post and crossing the line to make it 2-3.

With the chemistry of Fin. C and Adam. C up front, Adam was able to find a darting run from Fin into the box leading him to being pushed into the back, awarding Sidmouth another penalty which was once again converted by Adam. C giving Sidmouth the win at full time at 2-4.

A fantastic all round performance from the boys team from start to finish, but with an outstanding performance by Owen. B he was awarded with the Man of The Match. Well done everyone!

Job: Vehicle paint technician

About: A vehicle paint technician applies paint, cellulose and other protective or decorative materials to cars and other motor vehicles.

Responsibilities: Their responsibilities include maintaining equipment and protective clothing, using a spray gun to coat surfaces, and selecting and mixing appropriate paints and other materials.

Skills/linked subjects: A vehicle paint technician must have communicational and customer service skills. They must have an eye for detail and self-motivation.

Salary: An average salary in this career is £26,008. There are currently 12,264 jobs in this career nationally.

Job: Quantity surveyor

About: Quantity surveyors advise on financial and contractual matters relating to construction projects and provide support concerning the financing and materials required for projects.

Responsibilities: They speak with clients on project costs, formulate detailed cost plans and advise contractors and engineers. They are responsible for ensuring that a project remains within its cost limit.

Skills/linked subjects: Quantity surveyors need knowledge of construction, as well as managerial skills, communicational skills, and the ability to negotiate and interact with clients.

Salary: An average salary in this career is £43,105. There are currently 44,930 jobs in this career nationally.
