Year 11 & 13: I continue to be impressed with both Year 11 and Year 13 students. The majority of students achieved higher marks in their second trial exams and are focused and preparing well for their exams which start in the next few weeks. Students have been given their final countdown this week to support with revision. Whilst the Easter holidays will provide all students with time to continue with exam preparations, it is important that they also have some time away from their studies so that they can return refreshed and ready for the challenges ahead. I have no doubt that our students will achieve well this summer if they continue to remain as focused and determined as we have seen so far this year.

Community links: We know and value our position within the community and I am always pleased when we can continue to build links and work with other members of our wider community. We work as part of a learning community with our feeder primary schools and this year we are prioritising work around curriculum. We had the privilege of being able to spend time in Newton Poppleford primary school recently with a focus on History and Geography and will be continuing next half term as our Science leaders visit Sidbury primary school. Year 5 students also had the opportunity to attend a Science workshop at the College recently. Remember there are chess and other board games available in the Library at break and lunch for all students.






Red Nose Day

Holland and Belgium Trip

On Thursday 9th February Mrs Hurley, Mr Demetre, Miss Gosling and Mrs Liddle took over 30 students from Years 11, 12 and 13 to Holland and Belgium as part of their GCSE and A-Level Philosophy and Ethics course.

The trip included visits to many sites in Holland and Belgium associated with the First and Second World Wars and gave students an eye opening and unforgettable experience.

They began the trip with a focus on the Second World War, visiting the Anne Frank House in Amsterdam, Arnhem, Oosterbeck War Cemetery where men killed during the battle for the bridge at Arnhem are buried, and Vught Concentration Camp.

The second part of the trip focussed on the First World War. Three students laid a wreath for the College at the Last Post ceremony under the Menin Gate. The gate commemorates some of those killed in the First World War who have no known grave and has more than 54,000 names inscribed on it.

The group also visited Essex Farm Cemetery, Langemark German Cemetery and had the chance to walk through a trench at Hooge Crater.

The last stop was in Tyne Cott, the largest First World War cemetery containing 11,956 graves, 8,369 unidentified.

Throughout the trip the students were accompanied by an outstanding tour guide, Bruce, who used his wealth of knowledge and experience to make the trip very engaging for everyone.

Student Will said "Overall, we learnt an immense amount which certainly gave us a great deal to think about. The whole experience gave us the opportunity to reflect and, as a result, it had a profound impact on us all."









Science Workshop

During March we invited pupils from our feeder Primary schools in to take part in a Science workshop with the Science Department. The pupils were tasked with looking at different solutions and using equipment such a thermometers and test tubes to measure the changes and reactions when mixed with different substances.







Technology Centre Visit

On Wednesday 22nd February a group of Year 10 students had the opportunity to visit the Technology Centre at Exeter College. The event was arranged for allow students to explore what it's like to study technology post 16 at the College and think about future options.

The students learnt how to weld using virtual welding machines. All students improved their techniques over the sessions, with Connor achieving a pass rate of 95% on one of his welds. After some lunch they had a session on Robotics, where the students started building a variety of models using Lego Mindstorm. Unfortunately the students didn't finish the robots due to time constraints, but some were shown the basics of programming.

Whilst not all students are interested in engineering, the networking proved useful. They met a range of staff including one who had done the music technology course at the College. They also met Andy Wells who explained the importance of research in making decisions, the qualification levels and how they equate, and how important it is to do the best you can at GCSEs.







Music Equipment Donation

This term, the Sidmouth College Tech Team were very excited to take delivery of some incredible music technology equipment donated to the College. We would like to thank Devon Summerhayes, a local Sidmouth resident, who was pleased that his generous donation would be put to good use.






Bicton College Visit







Pi Day

Could your child – or one you know – be sexting images or videos of themselves?


With the majority of students owning a smart phone we have unfortunately noticed an increase in the taking, sharing and keeping of intimate and nude pictures of persons under the age of 18.

A-Level Drama Performances

Drama and Theatre A-Level students performed their C3 Texts in practice exam 2 weeks ago to an appreciative audience and the Senior AQA Drama examiner. This is the first year since the Covid restrictions impacted on this part of the A level exam.

Each student performed a 5 minute monologue taken from a range of plays from different genres and periods. These ranged from a political anti-war play 'US' set in 1966 to an extract from the highly acclaimed 2022 play 'Prima Facie' challenging the patriarchal judicial system. This is a challenge as, unlike a group piece, there is no one to rescue you if you forget your lines. You have only 5 minutes to showcase your ability. There are no second takes! Prior to this exam they had workshopped other styles and period extracts and completed a 3000 word Reflective report that demands they analyse the process of rehearsal and the acting skills they have applied to create and develop their characters. They must show evidence that they have applied the influence of a renowned theatre practitioner throughout the process.

Every student maximised this opportunity to display their ability and can be proud of their performances. They will now have to wait until exam results day to know how well they achieved their aims.
