The trip was one we will never forget, everyone had a fantastic time, and many of the year 12s are hoping to go again next year!"


Head of Humanities, Miss Hext, commented that students were a pleasure to be with throughout and that the trip helped students to

A*s all round for Drama Students

A level drama students celebrated their success in a piece entitled 'Divide-DID'. The students had spent over 50 hours devising an original piece of Documentary theatre based on the condition Dissociative Identity Disorder (DID), also known as Multiple Identity Disorder. Docu-theatre seeks to inform and entertain an audience about a subject they may know little about. It uses narration, facts and direct quotes from victims and perpetrators to tell real stories about real events. With increasing numbers of people being diagnosed with 'DID' each year, the



condition has affected millions of people, with cases being documented from as early as the 17th Century. The drama studio was transformed and projections created the backdrop as many of the audience were shocked by the real stories of people who live with the condition.

The external examiner was impressed by the inventive creativity in the piece. Adding that the stagecraft was effective and the overall performance was informative for the audience. Well done to Callum Burns, Vicky Wyant, Dottie Holland, Libby Parkes and Jasmine Bartlett.

RAMM Roman Coin Hoard

On Wednesday 22nd February the Royal Albert Memorial Museum (RAMM) visited the College to run a Roman Roadshow workshop for all year 7 students. The Museum in Exeter acquired the Seaton Down Hoard, a collection of over 22,000 Roman coins found within the College's catchment area, after their discovery in 2013. Sidmouth College was a supporting stakeholder of this acquisition and have developed a working partnership to celebrate the return of this historic find to Devon.

During the day students took part in a round robin of activities including a mock archaeological dig, using metal detectors and specialist equipment. They also examined artefacts from the Roman era as well as studying coins from the hoard itself, made their own Roman coins using stamps and took part in a storytelling session with a Roman re-enactor.



Tree Planting

On Friday 24th February 15 year 7 & 8 students worked with members of the Sidmouth Rotary Club to plant trees around the College and the Sports Hall.

Last year students worked with the Rotary club to plant new hedging along the footpath on Salcombe Hill, which is now working well to preserve




the environment along the South West coast path.

Science Live!

On Friday 3rd March the Science department took over 40 students

to Science Live in Bristol. During the trip students listened to experts including Professor Robert Winston and Professor Alice Roberts who discussed a variety of interesting topics.



STEM Workshop (report by Mrs Young, Careers Coordinator)

Year 10 students had the opportunity to attend the 'Inspire into STEM' event held at Flybe's training academy in Exeter this term. The event was introduced by the National Careers Service, students then met Johnathan Bell of Flybe, who described the range of current and future opportunities in Aeronautical engineering. Students examined some parts of planes with defects and considered the implications of these faults. The Education Business Partnership told students about the range of jobs in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) areas and how important they were, as well as developments and opportunities for the future.



Students also took part in four interactive activities with employers. Firstly with MB Engineering, looking at engineering and robotics, then with EDF, looking at the energy company and how they generate, supply and bill for energy. They also met with The Met Office and South West Water who had three activities for students, looking at and creating pipes for a pump, looking at a map and identifying how to regulate flow and look for leaks (maths problems) and then we looked at the environmental factors and looked at a model with contamination before and after rainfall.

The students enjoyed the event and some found it had helped them to think about what routes to take both post 16 & post 18 and the opportunities available.

GCSE Food Tech

In GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition this week year 10 students have been carrying out an investigation into the acceptability of alternative protein foods. Student worked in groups to make a range of Bolognese sauces using Quorn, soya, beef and lentils. They carried out sensory analysis of these to determine which they preferred. To their surprise meat wasn't the favourite! Quorn came top but lentils were also popular - even if it didn't look like traditional Bolognese - being blindfolded they couldn't tell)

This term Mrs Kirsch has started a new competition for students in Food Technology. Each lesson she has chosen students who deserve the coveted title of 'Star Baker'. These are students who have produced the most impressive and tasty dishes that week and presented them beautifully as well. set up a polling station to replicate the real voting process, as many young people are unfamiliar with this when they go to vote for the first time. The votes will now be collated and counted and the successful Heads and Deputy Heads will be announced after Easter.







Sidmouth Lions Club Legacy Pledge Project

Late last year, the Lions Club agreed a proposed Legacy Project to mark its milestone achievement of 40 years of community service. The Project, entitled 'The Sidmouth College Annual Pledge' has now been formally unveiled to coincide with the 100th anniversary of the formation of Lions Clubs International, the largest service club organisation in the world. As part of the celebrations, Lions Clubs globally have been challenged to establish a Centennial Legacy Project and, as Lions have always been keen to support projects involving young people, what could be more appropriate than a special Legacy Pledge in support of worthy students at Sidmouth College.



Accordingly, Lions President, Alan Shoesmith, has been discussing the basis of the inaugural pledge with James Ingham-Hill, the Sidmouth College Principal, and it has now been agreed that in 2017, the Club will pledge £1,074 to fund an adventure/leadership enrichment opportunity at Haven Banks Outdoor Education Centre in Exeter's historic canal and quayside. Consequently, 50 of Sidmouth College's Year 9 students, selected on the basis of sustained effort, will be transported by coach to the Haven Banks Centre on 16th May 2017.

On presenting this year's Legacy Pledge cheque to the Principal, Lions President Alan commented:

"We believe that this Legacy Project will prove to be of substantial benefit to college students at an important stage of their education. Subject to the Lions Club's continued fundraising success, there will now be an annual award funding similar events to inspire students to succeed for many years to come."

After receiving the cheque, College Principal, James Ingham-Hill said:

"As a College we are delighted and honoured to have the chance to work alongside the Lions Club to create the legacy project. Over the next few years, this partnership will ensure that hundreds of Sidmouth College students are given the opportunity to take part in an exciting enrichment opportunity. The concept of the Sidmouth College Annual Pledge is to challenge students to consistently perform above expectations throughout Year 9. It will link directly into the College's existing praise and reward structure".

Powderham Castle Music Room

The Sidmouth College Music department were grateful to be given the opportunity to visit the Music Room again on Friday 24th February. Mr Hickman accompanied a group of Year 9 and Year 10 Music students to see a selection of Opera highlights. The presentation by the singers was very entertaining and enjoyable.
