During the visit the group visited Langstone Rock and learned about the how the Devon Sandstone had originated from Africa 500 million years ago. They looked at the changing shape of the rock and how the weather and sea has eroded it over time. After a lunch break and time to enjoy the beachfront activities, the group went to the East side of the beach to look at offshore drift and the use of defences to protect the beach.

#### **Ten Tors**

After months of training nineteen Sidmouth College students successfully completed the Ten Tors challenge this term. Beaming smiles disguised their sore legs and feet as they crossed the finish line having hiked either 35 or 45 miles across Dartmoor, with all kit needed to be self sufficient for two days on their back.

On Saturday 29 April, students were awoken by the institutional Ten Tors alarm: Chariots of Fire at 5am over the loudspeakers. Students then set off at 7am as the canons marked the start of the 2023 event. Students then have until 5pm Sunday to complete their set route going via all checkpoints across the moor. Around 2500 young people took part in the challenge organised by the Army, all walking in teams of six people.

The two 35 mile teams consisted of Milly, Maddie, Charlotte, Heidi, Joe, Laurence, Ayla, Gracie, Radina, Ronja, Ned and Alastair all in Year 10. The 45 mile team, all of whom successfully completed the 35 mile route in 2022, consisted of Bronwyn, Harriet, Roman, James, Dan and Tom. Seven really strong year 11s trained for the 45 mile challenge this year but there are only six places in a team. An extra special mention to Sam who was so determined to complete the challenge, he did so with with another school's 45 mile team who were a person short.

Ten Tors is a tough physical challenge and test of determination and teamwork that remains with participants for years. Participation in the event is a longstanding tradition for Sidmouth College with continuing success for our teams. The training is as much a part of Ten Tors as the event and this begins in October. It requires months of effort both in school and on the moor throughout the winter months as students work together on their navigation, fitness and skills required to get around the event as a team.

Martyn Dudley, one of the 2023 Team Managers said 'the students have been a real pleasure to work with during the months spent







training for Ten Tors. Over the event weekend, they were a credit to themselves and the College. They should be very proud of all they have achieved in training, building confidence, developing map skills, demonstrating sheer determination and working together as a team, all celebrated as they enjoyed the event at the weekend. We look forward to running Ten Tors again for the 2024 event with new faces and some old faces returning to take up the 45 or 55 mile challenge'

Alongside this incredible commitment from students is the equally commendable commitment from the team of adults supporting the students and enabling this enrichment opportunity. Sidmouth College is very grateful to our experienced and skilled support team including volunteers Andy, Gabe, Geoff, Jen, Josh, Martyn, Matt and Nick for their time and expertise, and to staff members Mrs Clark, Miss King, and Mr Richards who also give up their free time to support the students. Much of the work goes on in the background from hours of admin and sorting kit, to 4.30am starts to set up base camp ready for the final weekend. Thanks also extend to the support students receive from their families. It really is a monumental effort from all involved.

Sidmouth College Ten Tors has recently received funding to support student participation, staff qualifications and to buy much needed new equipment. The Ten Tors students and team have been blown away by the financial support received from Sidmouth Town Council, the Alpkit Foundation and the WPA Foundation. The money received is going to make a huge difference. Thank you to all involved.

#### **EPQ Qualification**

Congratulations to Year 13 students Holly and Nola for completing their Extended Project Qualification this term.

New to the Sixth Form offer this year, and highly valued by employers and universities alike, the qualification is an opportunity for students to work over the course of ten months researching a topic of interest to them but outside the scope of their A-Level courses. The qualification is equivalent to having an extra half A-Level but the benefits are so much more in terms of developing students' character.

Students are required to produce a 5000 word dissertation working under the guidance of a tutor, very much in the style of a university seminar. At the end of the project students present their findings before fielding questions from a panel of staff.

The neurological effects of creativity was the subject of Holly's project whilst Nola looked at the development of the modern Hepatitis-B. Their research was detailed, their presentations articulate and engaging and both students deftly fielded the questions asked of them. Holly and Nola acquitted themselves superbly and have set the standard for the current Year 12, many of whom will begin their EPQ journey shortly. Well done, girls!

At the end of the session the students had a questionnaire to take home and complete with parents, family or friends to look at the careers of others.


#### Will Goes to Buckingham Palace

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#### **GCSE** Drama

GCSE Drama students tackled their C3 Text in a practice exam with energy and focused enthusiasm and apprehension. The task involves performing two extracts from published play texts to a visiting AQA examiner.

They had spent half a term preparing the two extracts which involved learning the lines and becoming the character in a monologue or duologue. The performance has to be in costume with props and they design their own setting and lighting to support their work.

The pieces chosen are challenging and complex with extracts from fifteen different plays. The examiner and the audience watched engaging and challenging performances tackling complex themes and situations such as a sister of a disabled young man challenging her parents, a scene depicting life in the battlefields of WW1, a mother and daughter reconnecting following a long prison sentence, two seven year old boys dealing with life in WW2, a challenging relationship where a mother agrees to bring up her daughters child as her own, a piece that deals with the impact on a friendship when one teenager is diagnosed with terminal cancer and another where 2 actors perform an adaptation of 'The Boy in the Stripped Pyjamas' set at a Concentration camp. These are just a flavour of the range of content explored by the students.

On the exam day thirty extract performances took place demanding a logistical approach as each group set up their set and performed. An array of large props including large fences, sofas, beds, blocks, tables, desks, chairs, stools and rugs were strategically placed in order to ensure a speedy transition from one performance to the next. Each performance was filmed as evidence to support the marking process for the examiner.

Each extract is marked out of 20 and accounts for 20% of their overall GCSE Drama Grade. The students will have to wait until results day in August to discover their marks and fingers crossed they will be happy with their hard work.





#### **Geography Fair Trade Chocolate Bars**

This half term Year 7 students have been learning about cocoa farming and fair trade companies in Geography lessons.. To complete the project in groups students were tasked with designing their own fair trade chocolate companies and chocolate bars. During the last week of term groups presented their designs to Mrs Gill and the rest of their class.

Mrs Gill's feedback was that they were all amazing, but a special mention needs to go to Faith, Christeen, Amelia and Elsie for their 'lucky dip' and intense marketing campaign, Chloe for her original 'Bees Knees' chocolate and Jake, Dylan, Hayden, Freddie and Marley for getting David Attenborough involved in their campaign. #### **Maths Challenge**

Over 90 students in Years 7 and 8 took part in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge on Wednesday 26th April.

The national challenge encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. 21 of our students won Bronze and Silver certificates.

Special mention goes to Ella who won Silver, best in Year 7 and best in school and Shanel who also won Silver and best in Year 8. A huge congratulations to all who took part. Some really incredible achievements!
